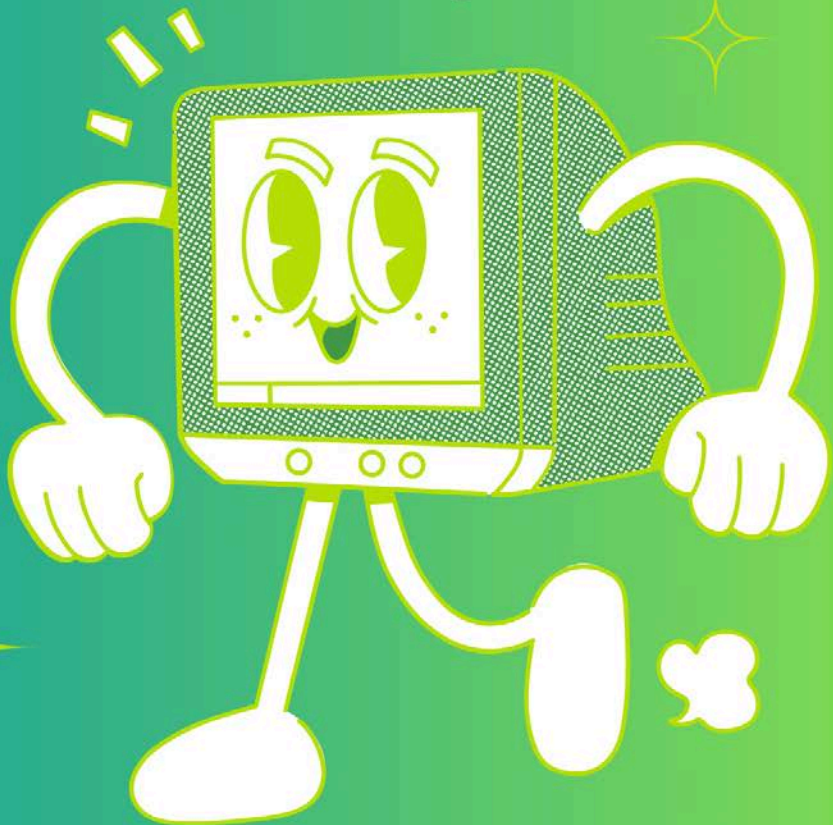


BATTERY DROP-OFF



Please drop off your batteries in the 2nd floor mailroom at the Administration building and we will recycle them for you!

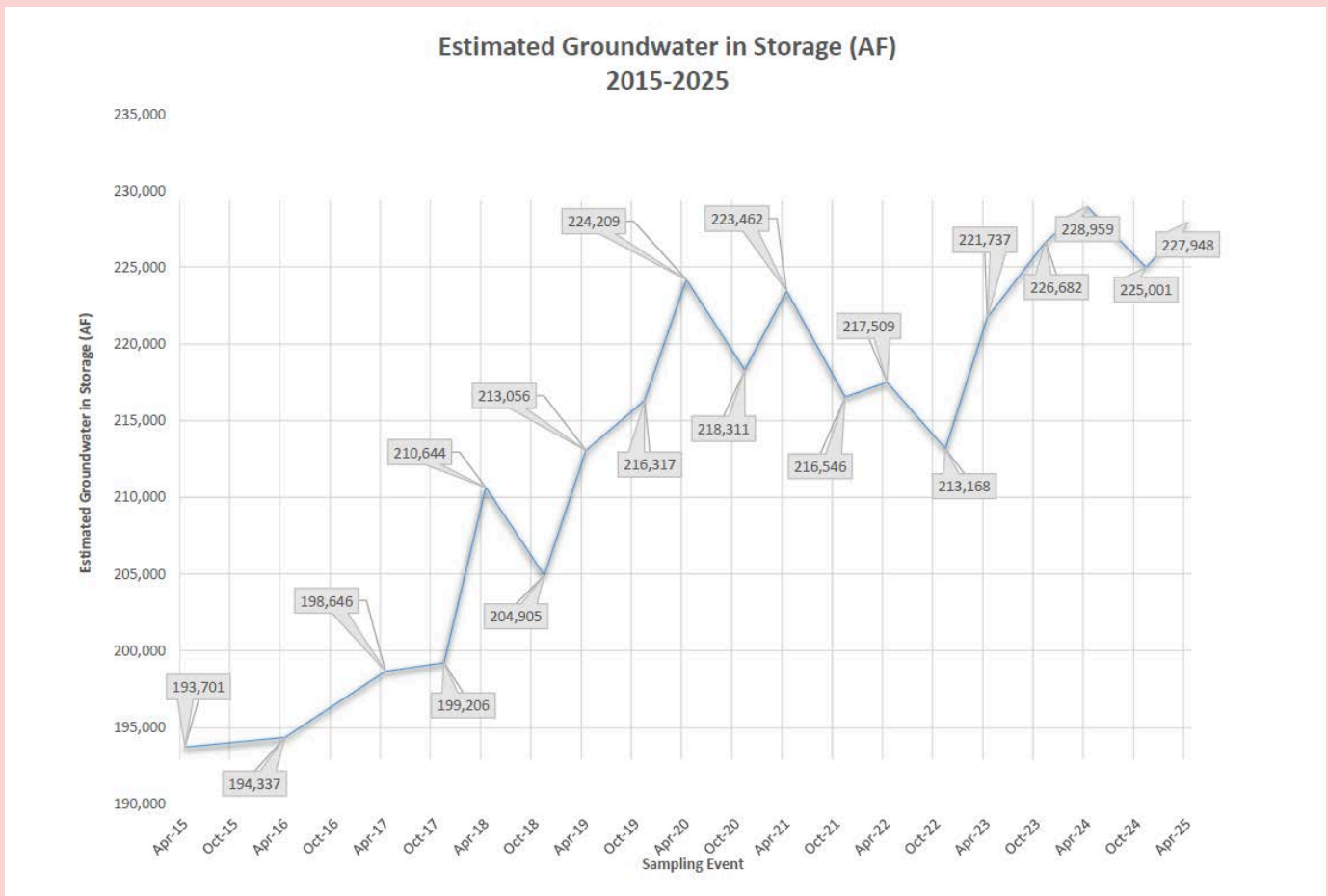

GROUNDWATER INFO

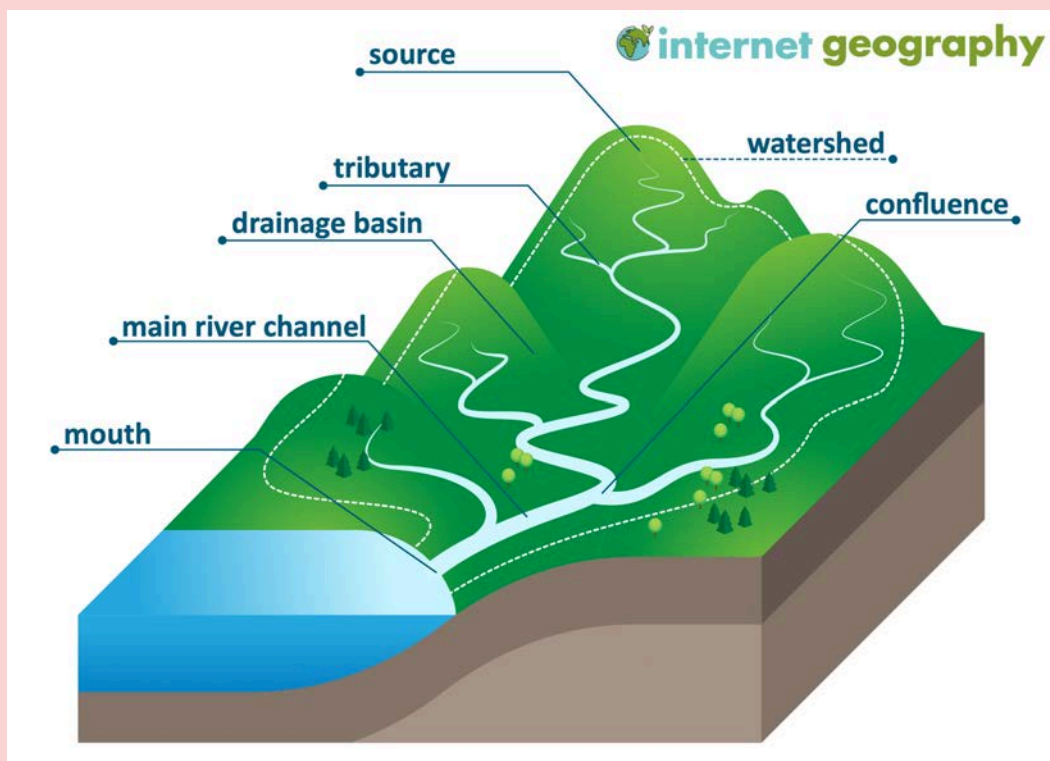
Groundwater is very important on the Soboba Reservation and San Jacinto Watershed (part of the Santa Ana River Watershed). Back in the 1900s, the Metropolitan Water District constructed a 13-mile-long tunnel through the San Jacinto Mountain. It drained a large portion of Soboba's groundwater resources and resulted in people moving away due to water shortages. After a long legal battle, Soboba was able to receive their water rights and municipalities, in turn, recharged the aquifer. The water levels finally began to rise (see graph below). Over the past 10 years, Soboba went from critical levels (restricted) to proactive levels (unrestricted use).

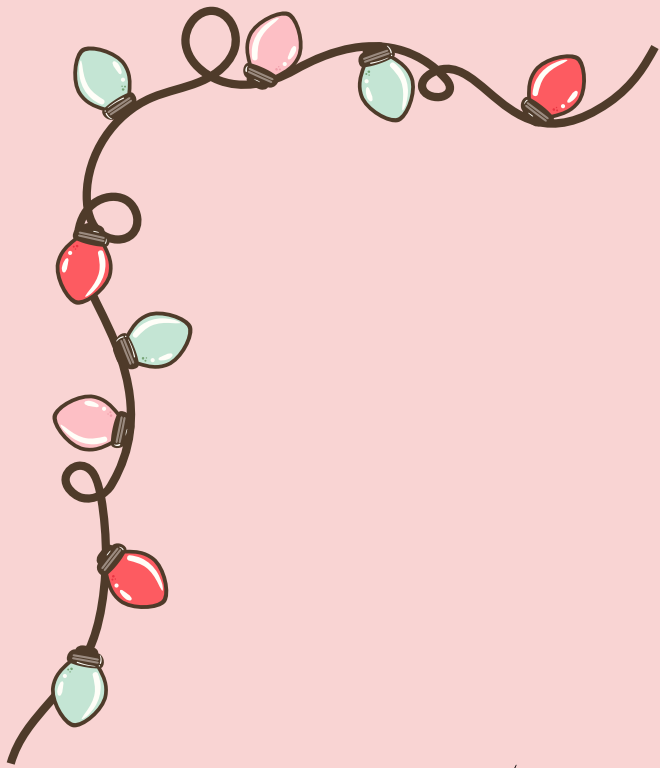


To visualize the quantity of water replenished, one AF, or acre-foot, is equivalent to 325,851.42857 gallons. Soboba's groundwater storage increased by 34,247 AF (11,159,433,874 gallons) over 10 years and that isn't taking into account the amount of water pulled from the aquifer on a yearly basis. That's a substantial increase!



The water cycle helps us understand how our water bodies and groundwater replenishment works. For more information on the water cycle, please watch this video <https://youtu.be/al-do-HGulk>. Two of our main sources for replenishment are rainfall and snow melting in the San Jacinto Mountain. You might have seen the water flowing through Poppet and Indian Creek tributaries and the San Jacinto River.
